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




The Full Justice Continuum





Contextual Analysis



 As part of the CND resolution 58/5 "Supporting the collaboration of public health and justice authorities in pursuing alternative measures to conviction or punishment for appropriate drug-related offences of a minor nature" the Government of Kenya, through NACADA with the support of the UNODC, debuted an initiative dubbed "Treatment and care for people in contact with the Criminal Justice System: Alternatives to Conviction or Punishment"

 Goal: supporting the development and mainstreaming of alternative measures along the criminal justice continuum for people with drug use

disorders.

Steps Taken

- 1. 4 targeted multi-agency workshops on Alternatives to Incarceration (ATI) for persons with drug use disorders in contact with the criminal justice system:
 - A Training for Policy makers on ATI (September 2021)
 - Follow up workshop on the work done by the various agencies, formation of the ATI Steering Committee and its operational framework (November 2021)
 - Follow up workshop on steps made (July 2022)
 - Follow up on progress and challenges (April 2024)
- 2. Formation of a multiagency steering committee to drive the agenda on ensuring take up and mainstreaming of ATI for persons with substance use disorders in contact with the criminal justice system (ATI)
- 3. Development of a National Action Plan characterised with short & long term goals in all the case proceedings stages: pre-trial, trial and post trial.
- 4. Case care management training and overdose management training for those with SUD and are in conflict with the law


Principles of Prosecutorial Diversion

- Effective prosecution pro-active involvement of prosecutors in case build-up and investigation of cases to ensure conviction of proper cases and promote public safety and security.
- **Efficient prosecution** evidentiary threshold for prosecution is increased from probable cause to *prima facie* evidence with reasonable certainty of conviction with a view of avoiding unnecessary pre-trial detention.
- Equitable prosecution prosecution is refocused to target big organized crime groups. Low-level offenses, such as drug use and miniscule selling in the context of drug use, are addressed by the public health approach that centers on human rights



Referral to Public Health as Alternative to Incarceration


Through INL support, the Philippines is cocreating a demonstration project on alternatives to incarceration.

What is the Role of the Probation Services Division in Alternatives to Incarceration

- To promote the rehabilitation of probationers, victims and dysfunctional families
- To empower through counselling and education,
- To promote a healthy lifestyle through proactive intervention.

Drug Treatment Court Process

- THIS COURT IS DESIGNED TO SUPERVISE CASES OF JUSTICE INVOLVED PERSONS WITH SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS WHO AGREE TO PARTICIPATE IN COURT SUPERVISED TREATMENT.
- THE DTC IS NON-ADVERSARIAL AND CONSISTS OF A TEAM LED BY A MAGISTRATE OR JUDGE
 THAT WORKS COLLABORATIVELY FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE PARTICIPANT.
- IN 2023 THE JUDICIARY OF TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO REVISED THE DRUG TREATMENT COURT AND IT IS NOW CALLED "THE DRUG TREATMENT COURT PROCESS" WHERE ANY COURT CAN NOW HAVE A DRUG TREATMENT COURT TEAM.

The Bail Supervision Progame

Young men and women are placed on bail with conditions.

These conditions entail:

- Curfews
- Restrictive travel
- Weekly reporting to the Probation Officer, who would then connect them to rehabilitative counselling, remedial classes and other life skills
- The participants are brought before a judge every two months for an update from the probation officer on their progress

Supervisory Probation

A person in the justice system is placed on supervisory probation for between one and three years

- If the probation order is breached, it can be revoked and the individual could be sentenced for the original offense.
- Some orders would have specific conditions such as attendance at meetings or drug rehabilitation centres
- Rehabilitative counselling programmes and interventions are geared towards preventing recidivism.
- Development of skills to encourage productivity, responsibility, accountability and secure employment
- Working on improvement in family relationships is a priority

Community Service Orders

 The court may order community service in lieu of incarceration for specific offences listed in the act.

A person can be ordered to perform community service for no less than 40 hours and no more than 240 hours in a specific period of time.

Electronic Monitoring

 Electronic monitoring was introduced to Trinidad and Tobago by Act No:11 of 2020

- A director's report determines a person's eligibility and suitability to be monitored electronically.
- Persons can be placed on electronic monitoring for criminal matters-such as larceny, robbery and murder, and domestic violence matters.

Decriminalisation of Marijuana

On December 11th 2019, the Dangerous Drugs Act was amended to remove criminal penalties for possession of up to thirty grams of cannabis.

- A fixed fine was imposed for possession of more than thirty, but fewer than sixty grams, and it would not impact an individual's criminal record if the penalty was paid
- This amendment removed a substantial amount of court matters from the criminal justice system – thereby reducing caseloads in the courts and the number of persons incarcerated
- Persons caught with small amounts of marijuana were no longer stigmatised with a criminal record
- Young men and women who could not get bail after being charged with possession of small amounts of marijuana were now released to become productive citizens

Case Care Management

- ▶ In 2021, the Executive Secretariat of the Inter-American Drug Abuse Control Commission, Organization of American States (ES-CICAD/OAS) embarked on a Pilot Project in Trinidad and Tobago to include a Care component in the case management of non-violent offenders with Substance Use Disorders (SUDs), who appeared before the Courts.
- ► The Case Care Management Programme (CCM) enhances coordination among the justice, health, social and other services that could be accessed by this group of persons, and assist with their recovery and their structured re-integration into society.
- ▶ The Pilot Project ended in 2023 and Probation Services Division is in the process of integrating CCM as an established programme.

Conclusion

Trinidad and Tobago continues to increase implementation of alternatives to incarceration, and the Probation Services Division stands ready to implement and redefine its approach to addressing the needs of justice involved individuals.

At this time a Parole system Is also being contemplated.

Over the years, as the Probation Services Division has supported more alternatives to incarceration, an improvement in the lives of the clients and a reduction in recidivism rates have been noted.
